St. James typically uses the month of October as the beginning of a season of stewardship. It is a time to reflect on the blessings we have received from God and to discuss ways to give back. The church community engages in this practice as a means of attempting to grow in all of the areas of ministry God has faithfully led us. If you think back, one year ago this week, we were celebrating the end of our stewardship season with a festive congregational gathering on October 6 which we called Consecration Sunday. It was a day for us to give thanks to God for the abundance of gifts that we have received. We then fed around 450 people a catered brunch out of the same jovful abundance.

At face value, we can probably all agree that 2020 hasn't exactly been a typical year, yet all the same, God's abundance and blessings have come shining through. Most people don't realize it, but blessings and curses often look the same in the beginning. In many ways this year has felt more like a curse than a blessing. Yet if we are to look a little harder, down deep and in faith, we all know that God would never curse us or leave us alone. Has this year been difficult? Sure. But the journey of the church

has always been a difficult one for those who take it seriously. Our God continues to create goodness in abundance and always works to change the negative into something positive.

The famous song "Seasons of Love", from the musical *Rent*, poses the question of how we might measure a year. "In daylights, in sunsets, in midnights, in cups of coffee. In inches, in miles, in laughter, in strife. In 525,600 minutes, how do you measure a year in the life?"

The chorus responds: "How about love? How about love? How about love? Measure in love. Seasons of love."

There is a universal truth that says, "To approach anything in the spirit of hopelessness is to make it hopeless. To approach anything in the spirit of faith is to make it a possibility.' Maybe God wants us to see things through the lens of possibility and love.

Think about this past year from the perspective of God's grace and love shining through: We've been forced to slow down our hectic lives, yet we might actually be better off with less to do... We've not been able to visit our loved ones who are sick or alone, and all of the sudden we're reminded how short life really is and how important these people really are to us... We were kept away from places of worship and sharing in the sacred, and now we realize the peace that comes from our sacred space and the

joy we receive belting out a hymn of praise... We've been unable to shake hands or receive a warm embrace, and now we understand how much we take for granted by being welcomed or embraced through the touch of another human being ... We've been forced to cover our faces in public and it's caused us to consider the simple freedoms and the very air that we breathe, and even the effects we have on other people... finding new ways to be a community, and we can go on and on. These are only a few of the scenarios that have plagued 2020, and in each something good is beginning to take form.

Friends, we have many reasons to be thankful. God is always doing something wonderful, even in the midst of our struggles and even if we don't see it at first. Please reflect on the congregational giving patterns we discussed last year. Many of you grew your giving "one step", increasing your weekly commitment to our church. Let's continue that trend and move up another step this year. Remember the underlying stewardship question-What percentage of your income is God calling you to give? Give back to God from the abundance you have been given, and from the love in your heart. Join me in looking for the good things God is doing here, and in our lives.



St. James Feeds Lunch to the Linemen



On Friday, September 25, members of the St. James Outreach Committee, Meal Ministry, and congregation came together and fed Fairhope City workers, as well as some out-of-town crews who came to get us back in business after

Hurricane Sally. With just over 24 hours' notice, this amazing group of volunteers came together to cook and serve hamburgers, baked beans, homemade coleslaw, chips, and homemade dessert to 285 men and women!! Perhaps the greatest accomplishment of all was that the burgers and beans were warm, and the coleslaw was cold at the time of pick-up!

It would be impossible to name everyone, but at least 20 people contributed to this meal, either by cooking or donating money. Andy Burton's Meal Ministry alone provided such a variety of desserts it would've been impossible to choose one if given a choice. Some parishioners made beans for 300 and coleslaw for 100! Thanks to one parishioner and several helpful children,

diners were greeted with posters of gratitude, and each meal box included a prayer and a note of thanks.

At first, the task was daunting, but I knew that if any group could come together and pull it off, it would be St. James. Even with a shortage of hamburger buns at some stores and no condiment packets at others (special thanks to Andree's for coming to the rescue), the community persevered and



provided what one city worker described as "the best meal we've had since the hurricane." The coleslaw recipes were in such high demand, that Andy collected them and sent them to the City for distribution.

"Thank you" is not enough to say for the gratitude I feel to be a member of such a loving church family who is always at the ready to be the hands and feet of Christ.

The St. James nursery will be open for the 10 am worship service, but we have some new policies which you need to be aware of before bringing your child/children to the nursery. We appreciate your cooperation.

- When you and your child arrive at the Wilson Education building, you and your child will be temperature checked and asked a series of screening questions.
- 2) A nursery worker will take your child into the building. We ask that parents do not enter the school building.
- 3) If needed, please send diapers and wipes with your child.

- Your child is welcome to bring a bottle or sippy cup. Make sure to label the bottle or cup with your child's name.
- 5) If your child has a pacifier, the pacifier needs to be clipped or attached your child's clothing.
- 6) Children will not be eating snacks in the nursery. Please do not send snacks from home.
- For pick up, please do not enter the school building. We will bring your child to you outside.
